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NYSUT membership: What it means for you



































As a NYSUT member, you benefit economically and professionally from the collective strength of the union. As a NYSUT member, you help build the union's collective strength through activism and community service.

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FOR YOUR WELL-BEING

- Salaries are higher when you're union. The median weekly earnings of union workers are nearly 30 percent higher than non-union workers. The union's collective voice allows it to negotiate with employers, arriving at mutually beneficial agreements that fairly recognize the value of members' work.
- You are protected by a contract.
 You have peace of mind knowing your salary, benefits and working conditions are established and defended.
- You have better access to comprehensive, affordable health care. Union members typically have better access to health care coverage including dental care, vision care and prescription drug benefits than do non-union workers, along with lower out-of-pocket costs. Other benefits paid leave and paid sick time are a hallmark of unionized workplaces.
- Your rights to a secure retirement are defended. Union members, because of their collective negotiating strength, are more likely to have pensions than non-union workers. The most recent statistics

- show that 77 percent of union members qualify for defined-benefit pensions, compared to less than 20 percent of non-union workers. And unions actively defend Social Security and Medicare benefits for all workers.
- Strong unions raise the standard of living in our communities. In states where unions flourish, the standard of living for all workers is improved. Where workers have the right to unionize, union pay and benefits lead the way, even as pay and benefits for all workers improve.
- You can access group discounts, insurance and other programs.



FOR YOUR PROFESSION

- The union gives you a strong voice at work. NYSUT defends high professional standards and respect for workers.

 When decisions affecting your profession are being made in Albany and Washington, D.C., NYSUT ensures your voice is heard. The union's advocacy, powered by grassroots member participation and expert legislative, legal and research staff, has a long track record of success in advancing the K-12, higher education, health care and human services professions.
- NYSUT strengthens workplace safety. Whether the issue is indoor air quality, unsafe labor practices or exposure to hazardous chemicals and other toxins, NYSUT has a long and successful track record of improving workplaces and enhancing safety for its members.



FOR YOUR RIGHTS

- You have an advocate by your side.

 NYSUT labor relations specialists are skilled negotiators working to ensure that your rights are protected through the collective bargaining process. Your LRS works with your local's president to provide assistance before, during and after contract negotiations to maximize the impact of members' collective voices. And your LRS helps untangle problems or workplace concerns.
- NYSUT's full-time staff attorneys, highly experienced in education, civil service and labor law, assist members with job-related issues, including certification, licensing and discipline. They go to court to protect the right to arbitrate grievances and enforce decisions made in your favor. This professional legal representation could otherwise cost you tens of thousands of dollars in private attorney legal fees; it is available to members at no cost. NYSUT's legal staff defends your rights up to the highest courts in the land.

- NYSUT cuts through red tape on your behalf. The union helps you navigate workplace bureaucracies, whether it's assisting with a certification problem or helping you meet new requirements for your job. Pension experts offer workshops and help members address retirement system concerns.
- You are supported in your career. Throughout your career, NYSUT offers continually expanding, high-quality professional learning opportunities. With workshops, training, research and grants, NYSUT provides resources to help advance your expertise on the job.
- The union offers peer-reviewed graduate education opportunities. NYSUT's Education & Learning Trust provides quality courses for graduate
