But still a really great photo and kudos to whoever decided to run it as large as you did. Too often these photos are run way too small to have any impact.

And finally, a full-page collage shows "the best protest signs" at the rally – a creative look at some creative signs. These colorful photos do an excellent job of conveying the message of the rally. The photo on the cover is especially effective, with the smiling faces above the signs, and the children in the front. The collage of the signs is not quite as eye-catching. Although the sayings are clever and funny, people's eyes are drawn to faces more than to words, which is the point of using a photo.

Actually, because the website is limited almost exclusively to these news items and the home page resembles a Facebook page, I would use Facebook to get this information out and rework the website to provide more of the traditional information items: member benefits, contract info, community service projects, professional development, links to education-related sites, etc. This local does a great job of getting news out to members, but that could be done more easily and efficiently on Facebook – and members would be able to respond/react immediately. Also, the group's logo is not high-resolution. It's very pixilated.

On the day I visited, the only story on the home page was about an important general membership meeting that was less than a week away. There was no need to scroll down to find more information, since everything the member would want to find was contained in the tabs along the top. My only suggestion would be to convert the PDFs on the secondary pages to actual content on the pages, and program the links to open another page when you leave the site.
