Since none of them are identified anyway, consider shooting some of these up close and concentrating on one or two people rather than the entire table. All in all, a nice publication.

This publication breaks a lot of the traditional rules of layout, but it also has a charming look and I'm guessing it's quite popular. Keep up the good work.

The Social Events Update, accompanied by many excellent photos, is enough to make anyone regret having missed a single meeting. The Retirees' Corner offers page after page of interesting and inspirational stories of the accomplishments and adventures of various members. The first-person account of the recording session is especially good. There are also several good union and education-related articles. My only suggestions would be to stop putting graphics behind the words. The pages with the graphics under the type range from difficult to almost impossible to read.

Judge 3: Lots of photos in this newsletter. The cover serves as a photo hint to what's on the inside pages. Those inside pages are compartmentalized into social items, features and education/labor reports and information. The writing is good and seems to be relatively free of typos, etc. Maybe it's just me, but I find it hard to read a one-column format on an 8.5x11 page. Two columns or even three seems easier to follow. Lots of white space, and the photos are good sizes. My only quibble on the inside pages is I would use a larger type for headlines, rather than just using body type that is bold-faced and underlined. On the cover, I would box the flag – the name of the publication, the description and the slogan – to separate it from the news and photos. It all runs together with the descriptions over the photos.

Judge 1: A very meaty newsletter — news, analysis, politics, photos — a good combination!

Judge 2: This excellent publication is packed with both important information and inspirational stories. The cover story has an interesting and unique perspective on a speech by the WCT president at a Board of Education meeting, comparing it to one delivered by Martin Luther King Jr. Photos are an important part of the publication, with an excellent spread on the St. Patty's Day Parade, and many more complementing the excellent article on the wolf specialist. The layout is attractive, but perhaps a bit too crowded and colorful, and the letters and words under the type are distracting and hard to read.

Judge 3: There is a lot to like in this newsletter. Nice layout, colorful and creative headlines, very creative writing on a wide variety of subjects, and lots and lots of crisp photos. There seems to be an ongoing effort to attempt new ways to attract readers by constantly looking for better ways to package their information and display it. Not everything works (the WCRT "ghosted" across the front page, for instance. It's too dark), but there is certainly willingness to work to keep the product fresh. You might love — or not love — the cover story that compares the local president's speech at a board of ed meeting to Martin Luther King and his 1963 "I have a dream" speech. Like it or not, it's a clever piece of writing under a headline that dares you NOT to read the story: "WCT Prez: I Have a Dream too." Congratulations to all who are involved in getting this newsletter out to the members.

One quibble: If you want to "ghost" an image behind the type, as was done here, dial back the color a bit and make it lighter so it doesn't compete with the type. Wherever the ghosted image appears, it's difficult to read the type within it.

When you're designing a page, your first, second and even third consideration has to be readability.

Judge 3: Great headline on page 6. This centerspread layout has a kind of NY Daily News look about it (which is a compliment). Nice, clean, three-column layout, lots of good, well-placed photos with information-filled captions. The writing is good and the type is clean and free from apparent typos, etc. I like the idea of the green-and-brown ball field ghosted behind the type. It's attractive and very clever but I found it hard to read the type covered in green. I think it would have had much more impact if both colors were several shades paler. It would move the graphic behind the type, rather than in front of it. But all in all, this is a very professional production. Congratulations.
