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Hilda Monfredo honored as SRP of the Year at RA

When Hilda Monfredo was asked to be the greeter at Sullivan West High School four years ago, she hesitated. Monfredo loved her work as a teacher aide in a special education classroom setting and thought she would miss interacting with the students. She needn't have worried. "Now I see every student who walks through that door, every day," said Monfredo. "I am the first line of defense at Sullivan West." Monfredo was honored as NYSUT 2013 School-Related Professional of the Year at the 41st Annual Representative Assembly in Washington.

She is dedicated to the backpack pantry program the Western Sullivan United Teachers and School-Related Personnel Backpack Pantry began. "We have many children in our school district who

Donahue spoke of the daily impact SRPs have on the lives of the students in their care.

"SRPs make a difference! And, we are making sure the public knows it,"

said Donahue, about the roll out of NYSUT's SRPs Make a Difference campaign.

Donahue encouraged every region to participate in the campaign. She stressed the importance of letting communities know SRPs are an important component in the high quality educational experience that public schools provide.

Delegates adopted a number of SRP driven resolutions. One directs NYSUT to push the State Education Department to adopt regulations that put SRPs on districts' professional development committees, another encourages NYSUT's labor relations specialists to recommend local leaders include professional development language in contracts that cover SRPs, and the third resolution adopted advocates to making assault on any teacher or SRP a class D felony.

NYSUT delegates honored Hilda Monfredo, the NYSUT 2013 SRP of the year at the opening session.

The SRP exhibit booth staff distributed information for and about SRPs as well as information about the Employees' state Retirement System. Many SRP leaders visited this booth.
