Judges' Comments:

This is a well-written, forceful rebuttal to Gov. Cuomo's comment about pedophiles in the classroom. The author notes how that comment is a slur on all teachers and urges union members to answer back by taking the steps outlined in a sidebar. Well done, especially the reminder that complaining won't get the job done – members have to act. Really good job of linking current political climate with not just the need to defend your profession but also with specific strategies the reader/member can use. Also, excellent use of cartoon, although I didn't think the Tony Robbin's quote added much and that space could be better used to give your readers another sentence or two of information about how anti-public ed forces outspend those who favor public ed by 15 to 1 or even the missed opportunity that up to 40 percent of all VOTE-COPE funds come back to the local for your use.

Judges' Comments:

This entry is an interesting examination of what successes union members have had in mitigating Cuomo's anti-public school agenda, along with a look at what NYSUT officers are doing to join the battle. Good work. Very good job of laying out the work your members have done, the results of that work and then noting that more work needs to be done. But then your points get confusing and I actually wonder if paragraphs or sentences were transposed. Directly after the sentence "Whatever the reason, NYSUT must do a better job conveying how they are leading the battle against Governor Cuomo" comes the sentence that starts "In an attempt to get their message out" and then a 9-point legislative plan is referenced and the essay ends with "NYSUT's 9-point

plan will certainly be their guide, as well as ours, as we moved forward to protect public education here in New York."

Judges' Comments:

A very good article on a speech by Diane Ravitch, complete with examples of how ludicrous test questions can be. Very good recap of not just a speech but also the whole issue of education reform. Excellent use of the editorial "we" and really personalizing the event for those who might have missed it, or recapping it for the 1,000 who were. I actually wanted to hear more about the panel discussion you referenced!

Judges' Comments:

The layout is good. You took on a huge job of trying to explain the complex political issue of the governor trying to do more than just deliver a state budget to the legislature for approval, but then only followed up with "He can get his way. Well, he can, mostly." Then laying out the war that is being waged in a concise manner but ending with "Can you say charter school?" is confusing. A turn of the page however is a great example of strong writing complemented by a membership photo. This really works and I hope that page went up on bulletin boards across your district. Strong persuasive ending. I would have argued to take out the word "dear" as an adjective to describe the governor. It's stronger without it. This entry is just a single graph, which isn't really a writing sample.

Judges' Comments:

Very good job of making union membership meaningful and bringing average topics to life. Very nice description of what would happen with a union. A few more specific examples of what you learned at the meeting would have strengthened this entry. Better yet, give one example of what you learned and then explain how it would help every member in your administrative professionals unit.

Local: Pembroke Teachers' Federation Category: Best Writing 1 Name of Entry: PTF Members Join Thousands in West Seneca Publication/Website: PTF Messenger

Judges' Comments:

It could have been developed more. There are many photos but they are understandably small. It would have been better to print fewer photos and size them appropriately. Good job of overview reporting. You got in the who, what, why, where and when. I applaud the use of membership photos that show real engagement. Nice twitter graphic and explanation. What would have strengthened this entry was adding information about how to attend the next rally or other actions the member could do to support these efforts.

Local: Schalmont Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 1 Name of Entry: We All Deserve Better Than This: Enough is Enough Publication/Website: STATIC Issue Date: May 2015

Judges' Comments:

This is a first-rate speech on Common Core and its flaws. Good points that are well written and compelling in their logic. The blue background for a break-out quote is too dark, though, although the photo is excellent. Not sure if this is an original contribution to the newsletter or a reprint. While it is usually better to say what you are rather than what you are not, you make this work. This entry starts strong with clear views and grows stronger with specific examples of harmful education reform and then brings the

topic to the most personal level as the writer discloses her cancer diagnosis. This skilled educator explains the impact of the flawed rollout of the assessments on her students and her profession and even her own children. Kudos!

Local: Thousand Islands Education Association Category: Best Writing 1 Name of Entry: TIEA River Rat Retiree's News Publication/Website: The TIEA Voice Issue Date: December 2015

Judges' Comments:

Very nice compilation of what retirees are doing. Photos are lively and interesting and convey a great deal of information. Also love the graphic treatments. I am certain this is a well-read section of The TIEA Voice, but I am not certain this entry shows original writing.

Local: Waterville Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 1 Name of Entry: Have You Commented on APPR Regulations Yet? Publication/Website: Waterville Teachers' Times Issue Date: July 2015

Judges' Comments:

The entry consists of a reminder to comment on the Regents regulations. The reminder is well taken and attractively packaged, but the text is too brief to be weighed as a writing sample. This is a great headline. The article also does a good job of explaining the legal issues surrounding the APPR regulations. Also a good job explaining how to comment to the State Education Department, but this entry would have been strengthened if it had explained why comments are needed.

Best Writing 2 – Class I

Local: Bellmore-Merrick United Secondary Teachers Category: Best Writing 2 Name of Entry: A Tribute To A Great Friend Publication/Website: Local Do's Newsletter Issue Date: Oct/Nov 2015

Judges' Comments:

O, what an entry! A beautiful tribute to an extraordinary teacher. Lovingly written. And the photo is outstanding! It speaks volumes about what a presence this teacher must have been in the classroom. Excellent all around. Wonderful recollections of a teacher's life and impact. Great use of specifics and concrete descriptions really help the reader try to get to know why this death deserved such a tribute.

Local: Edgemont Teachers Association Category: Best Writing 2 Name of Entry: RALLIES IN NYC AND WHITE PLAINS Publication/Website: ETA PIPELINE Issue Date: April 2015

Judges' Comments:

This account of rallies in White Plains and NYC covers the range of current issues from testing to teacher evaluation, etc. The article is well done but the photos are too dark and too small. This is a most misleading headline. Because instead of getting a recap of two rallies, the reader gets an extremely perceptive analysis of why teachers are having these rallies and the need for them. Skilled use at bringing the larger issues to a personal level as well. Editing one extremely long, run-on sentence into at least three separate ones would have strengthened the concluding paragraph.

Judges' Comments:

Nice photos. This was fun to read. Great use of graphics and pull-quotes from Dr. Seuss. It would be interesting to see the original material you pulled from retirees because I have a feeling you made the proverbial purse out of a sows ear by crafting enjoyable recaps, however I am uncertain how much of this is original writing. I'm glad this section is also entered under general excellence, so I can address a bit more there.

Local: Lewiston-Porter Administrative Professionals Category: Best Writing 2 Name of Entry: LPAP Bake Sale Publication/Website: Lewiston-Porter Administrative Professionals Issue Date: Sept/Oct 2015

Judges' Comments:

Who would have thought a recap of a bake sale could be so enjoyable to read? This writer displays a nice humorous touch with a rather mundane topic. This entry would have been strengthened with several sentences about why the LPAP raises funds for the Making Strides efforts.

Local: Pembroke Teachers' Federation Category: Best Writing 2 Name of Entry: PTF Pride Publication/Website: PTF Messenger

Judges' Comments:

Attached were 9 photos with the headline PTF Pride! The photo collage is nicely done. This compilation is excellent as it shows a range of faces in different places and formats that are quite interesting. Very nice job of showing members. I consider it a strong contender for best original photographs.

Local: Schalmont Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 2 Name of Entry: From Apple Tree to Willow Tree Publication/Website: STATIC Issue Date: May 2015

Judges' Comments:

An original perspective on apple and willow trees and cores and CORE. The writer cleverly weaves these themes throughout a piece that ends with a vow to weather the storm. Nicely done. Extremely effective essay. It takes a skilled writer to weave everchanging standards with gardening and pruning and the importance of solidarity. Excellent descriptions and a very nice way of tying the intro with the main points and to the conclusion.

Local: Thousand Islands Education Association Category: Best Writing 2 Name of Entry: Did You Know...& Breakwater Gallery Publication/Website: The TIEA Voice Issue Date: June 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry consists mostly of news nuggets and graphics. The packaging is attractive but the content is sparse. Nice compilation of tips, ideas and updates for the members. The graphics are nice. This entry would be strengthened by more explanation about why the union participates in Relay for Life. Or even about the chick-hatching event: Such as does Mary Mason always donate an incubator? What will happen to the chicks at the end of school?

Local: Waterville Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 2 Name of Entry: Member Profile: Tammi Picolla Publication/Website: Waterville Teachers' Times Issue Date: July 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry is a brief member profile of a teacher who witnesses students grow up before her eyes and who watches over her own kids in life's journey. It could be improved if the main theme were developed more. Profiles are a great way to spotlight members. This profile gives great information about this member. I am not clear if you provide questions for the member to answer or let them write their own profile but I love the explanation about "best Waterville experience." This entry could be strengthened with a question or section for the member to either ask for, or give, classroom or collegial advice just to make this piece more interactive for the members.

Best Writing 3 – Class I

Local: Bellmore-Merrick United Secondary Teachers Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: The Soul of Calhoun H.S. Publication/Website: Local Do's Newsletter Issue Date: Oct/Nov 2015

Judges' Comments:

This tribute of a teacher and friend is heartfelt and moving. It is another example of the extraordinary people who enter the teaching profession. While the writer is obviously mourning the loss of a friend as well as a teacher, he could have focused less on that relationship and more of what his friend meant to Calhoun High. This essay gives even more insight into Doug Smestad's life and impact. Nice job on a difficult topic. Explaining some of the lessons learned could have strengthened this entry. So many of these entries were about one teacher, it is hard to judge them individually.

Local: Edgemont Teachers Association Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Dear Colleagues Publication/Website: ETA PIPELINE Issue Date: April 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry focuses on the writer's letter to the editor of a local paper slugging it out with Gov. Cuomo. The real gem of this entry comes at the end though, with a very clever and revealing computation on how teachers could be paid just \$3 an hour and wind up earning more than \$500 per day if they were compensated for the number of students they teach in a day. This is what should have been front and center as it exposes the sham behind the Cuomo claim that teachers are overpaid. What a whirlwind! This entry starts with a thank you to the membership for help during a convalescence and then a reprint to a letter to the editor to an excellent math lesson on what public salaries really should be. The letter to the editor would have been strengthened with a bit more explanation on why the writer is unhappy with a Senator's vote on ed reforms, and a spelling check.

Local: *Fillmore Central Schools Faculty Association* Category: Best Writing 3

Name of Entry: Fillmore Faculty Association Member Brendan Heaney scores a "dream" interview with Governor Andrew Cuomo Publication/Website: Association Press

Judges' Comments:

This is an imaginative "dream" interview with Gov. Cuomo. It covers the key points in the teachers vs. Cuomo battles but it could have been a little subtler and less contrived. A good effort nonetheless. The page lacks graphics. Interesting entry. While I understand where this satire comes from and how it can feel so good to vent, the best satire is grounded in reality. There is so much fodder where you could use actual quotes and/or actual instances to make your points. For example, referencing Cuomo's "Hunger Games" approach forcing regions of the state to compete for funds rather than the section that starts "My politics is reserved for New York City and Long Island" I think would have been more persuasive. This entry also had spelling and grammar errors and inconsistent capitalization, but perhaps that was intended.

Local: Pembroke Teachers' Federation Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: PTF Rings in the Holiday Season Publication/Website: PTF Messenger

Judges' Comments:

If the three sentences under the headline above was the entry for best writing, little information was provided to readers other than who, when and what. This entry would have been strengthened with information on why these union members take valuable time during the holiday season to help the Salvation Army; where this event took place; what else the union does to support the less fortunate during the holidays, or a quote from the Salvation Army about what it means to their organization to have unions participate. A better entry would have been the five-paragraph story below titled "Raise some orange to end violence against women." Even in that story, it is unclear if the local union is doing something more than providing information. Did the union put an orange light somewhere in its offices or display posters or banners? Notice the difference a sentence such as "Join the PTF as it installs orange lights and displays posters this month" can make.

Local: Schalmont Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: A Failing Grade for Tests Publication/Website: STATIC Issue Date: May 2015

Judges' Comments:

This is a look at the sharp contrast between the writer's 4th grade class before the testing craze took hold and today's 4th grade class where the students are anxious and nervous over facing these tests. The contrast speaks volumes about how today's rigid priorities are damaging tomorrow's adults. It could have been improved with judicious editing to reduce the length so as not to overwhelm the writer's key points. Very good insights. Very good example of bringing personal experiences, perspectives and history into a current event. Concrete descriptions of how classrooms differ over 14 years are strong and written well. Also, skilled linking of the intro to the penultimate paragraph. A very good job that would be strengthened with a finer edit. For example, when you come across a sentence that starts "I hate to drop a bomb, but here's a little secret:"

Local: Thousand Islands Education Association Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Local Action News Publication/Website: The TIEA Voice Issue Date: October 2015

Judges' Comments:

Good recap of different efforts the union undertakes to benefit both students and the community. The description of how to deal with bullying appears helpful for those schools that could not participate in the assembly. This entry would have been strengthened with better attention to the math in the fundraiser article. If \$5,500 was raised and \$2,000 went to a member and over \$2,000 went to the student scholarship fund, it would be far better to say almost \$1,500 went to fire departments in Clayton, Cape Vincent, Fishers Landing and Depauville; or say that \$400 each went to the fire departments. Just something so the reader isn't left wondering what happened. It's also fair to note if the union covered the cost.

Local: Waterville Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: WTA Supports Cruisin' into Waterville Publication/Website: Waterville Teachers' Times Issue Date: Sept. 2015

Judges' Comments:

This is a humorous look at a dunking contest – for a good cause – of WTA members. Nice recap of the union's efforts to raise funds for a scholarship and very nice to thank those community groups that helped the union make this event a success. This article would have been stronger with just a bit more information for those who could not attend or might be new to this. Questions I had were: How many WTA members were dunked? Who got dunked the most? How much did folks pay? How many years has the union does this? (Because of the way the article starts), and who qualifies for the memorial scholarship?

Best Writing 4 – Class I

Local: Bellmore-Merrick United Secondary Teachers Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Common Core Prep in Pre-K Publication/Website: Local Do's Newsletter Issue Date: March 2015

Judges' Comments:

Very good article on the absurdity of some Common Core test questions, such as the one on Stephen Hawking and cosmology for 10R students. The writer also confesses to getting three Common Core English questions wrong. Taken together, these examples show how unfair and demoralizing these tests can be. Effective way of bringing personal experience with your own child to highlight issues with implementation of the Common Core, and then going one step further and reporting your own results taking an English exam. Strong descriptions and logic are well represented and persuasive. Using an active voice would strengthen this entry.

Local: Edgemont Teachers Association Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Dear Edgemont Colleagues Publication/Website: ETA PIPELINE Issue Date: Dec. 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry is a mix of tributes to a young teacher who died and observations on Common Core. This column had a difficult task of recognizing the death of a young colleague as well as noting the involvement of colleagues who supported each other and the woman's family and then provide information about the new federal implementation of the Every Student Succeeds Act. It is jarring to go from a thank you to teachers who volunteered to substitute for those who wanted to attend the funeral, to the next sentence telling people "work we have left to do." If it's any consolation, few writers could do that successfully.

Local: Pembroke Teachers' Federation Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Summer Leadership Conference Publication/Website: PTF Messenger

Judges' Comments:

This three-sentence entry gives the barest of details of what a summer leadership conference is. Missing is a reason why members would give up three days of their summer for a meeting or any concrete description of what happened. Here are three sentences, and fewer words, that give more info. "How to respond to attacks on the teaching profession" was just one workshop members of the Pembroke Teachers Federation attended at the NYSUT Summer Leadership conference at the Peak n' Peak resort. NYSUT President Karen Magee kicked off the three-day conference with an overview of current events and the statewide union's response to a number of legal and legislative challenges. Your representatives will update all PTF members on these issues and much more when we see you back at school this fall.

Local: Schalmont Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Rotterdam Teachers Unite to Call Out Cuomo Publication/Website: STATIC Issue Date: May 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry is largely a report on a Rotterdam Teachers Unite event and a letter writing campaign in support of public education. Good job of putting a positive spin on such a negative issue. Noting the need to unite against attacks is so necessary yet often forgotten. Concrete and specific descriptions of actions members took strengthened this entry. This is a writing competition, but this entry backed it up with strong photos that were perfectly placed on the main page. The headlines across the bottom "Respect Public Education IT WORKS" also contributed to the piece. Photos on the second page also showed strength in numbers as well as highlighting an active membership in both local unions.

Local: Thousand Islands Education Association Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Political Action News Publication/Website: The TIEA Voice Issue Date: February 2015

Judges' Comments:

This is an extremely effective page of information for member. I do not think it qualifies for best writing but I would strongly recommend this for the Best Info Graphic award. Excellent work.

Best Writing 5 – Class I

Local: Bellmore-Merrick United Secondary Teachers Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: State of Affairs Publication/Website: Local Do's Newsletter Issue Date: March 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry is mainly an account of a member's experience calling a state senator to convey concerns about education, using NYSUT talking points to help the conversation along. A fresh look at union action in person, coupled with a call to action for all members to speak out on behalf of public schools. The article is mainly a report, however. This writer takes us on a personal journey of becoming a more active member. Strong descriptions complement humorous interjections to liven this essay up. Persuasive without being preachy is a strong skill to employ. I really hope you keep writing. Kudos!

Local: Schalmont Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: Just Because You Went to School Publication/Website: STATIC Issue Date: May 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry focuses on what must irritate teachers the most when they hear critics say the public school are failing – namely, that the critics are always those who don't teach and aren't qualified to criticize. Teachers are the experts of teaching, and they are the ones politicians should listen to when proposing "reforms." Good points well taken. Enjoyable to read this writer taking on the favorite game of finger pointing. Usually, we would advise writers to not take attacks personally, but this writer is able to take things personally and turn the arguments totally around. Giving example after example of why attendance in her personal opinion does not equal to being an expert in that field builds to a logical conclusion. One piece of constructive criticism is to delete "I would just like to state that." Just start with "I have completed New York State college programs in my chosen fields of mathematics and special education" See how that makes it stronger?

Judges' Comments:

Very nice job to spotlight new members and in such an interesting format. Love the use of the graphics to highlight the trivia answers. I am just not certain this Q and A format belongs in this writing category. Also be more careful with proofing for grammar errors and typos.

General Excellence – Class I

Judges' Comments:

This entry has essentially only one article of substance although there other informative items, including a retirement update. It could be improved with more content and graphics. Extremely informational newsletter in an easy-to-read format. You pack a lot of info into four pages. Your members should appreciate how you try to make information a two-way street in such a skilled manner. Keep up the good work.

Local: Bellmore-Merrick United Secondary Teachers Category: General Excellence Publication/Website: Local Do's Newsletter Issue Date: Oct/Nov 2015

Judges' Comments:

Hands down the best of the lot. The tributes to this extraordinary teacher are beautifully written and lovingly rendered. They are free of the standard banalities that appear in so many eulogies – he'll be missed; RIP, always in our hearts. Instead there are lines like this: "Whenever I pass by his classroom I hear his words of wisdom whispering in my ear." Beautiful. And the photos! Outstanding! They capture this teacher's charisma, his soul. What a presence he must have been in the classroom! Beyond the tributes there is another message that shines through, albeit not explicitly expressed. It is this: There is no way – none – that this teacher's life could be reduced to an evaluation score. His knowledge, talent and impact on those he touched in life cannot be reduced to a number. Thankfully his colleagues have given us the full measure of this man – a teacher's teacher. This local is to be commended for devoting an entire issue to the memory of a colleague. More substantive content would help as well.

But then this gets confusing because pages 1-5 are numbered; then there is the two-page dream interview and then the last page is numbered 7. This may seem nit-picky but with the fierce competition you are up against in this category I have to take this into consideration. Great job on the graphics, the photos and reproduction in this newsletter. You do so much right it is the smallest of errors that keep you from the top.

Judges' Comments:

This entry has an interesting layout and good graphics. It could be improved with more content. Great way to give your members the exact resources for the information they need rather than you trying to reinvent the wheel and repurpose what someone else has already done. You really pack a lot of information in for your members. I wonder if you have an association logo you could use instead of the district's, because this looks like it came from administration. The section about Offices up for Election raises some questions. Are the incumbents not running? When is the election? How will it be held? Keep up the good work.

Judges' Comments:

This entry has a varied and colorful layout. However, the newsletter could be improved with more substantive content to add to the various shorter items that are included. Great job on your cover page. That format works perfectly. It is clean and easy to read. It gives a great deal of information in one column and even has a call for the membership to submit news across the bottom. I appreciate the tone of the President's Column. It takes a skilled communicator to go from welcoming new members to dealing with representative changes to thanking members for their efforts as well as giving basic membership info in five paragraphs. Judges' Comments:

This entry is packed with information on a variety of topics. On content alone it stands out for thoroughness. It could be improved with a design makeover, however. The typeface is too black and the pages are so crammed with type, with little white space to offset the black look. The occasional color squares seem almost garish in contrast to the black. The newsletter deserves better – a cleaner look will turn it into a winner. Great cover. I wondered what STATIC stood for. Love the quote treatment across the bottom. This makes me want to look inside, even though not a single article is referenced. Effective second page that gives members all they need to know about union leadership, who their building representatives are and how to submit to STATIC. The President's Report is well done as it lays the groundwork on what members are facing from their own local administration. Skilled use of cause and effect by the president.

Excellent recap on Political Action that explained for members not just how the state union and its allies worked, but also what the local union did especially on page 8. Excellent reprints of articles that ran in the state paper. This local understands the need to credit where the articles first ran and also that many members might not have found those articles in a state publication. Excellent remembrance of Eleanor Linberg. Using concrete examples, the writer explains how a teacher who had been retired nearly 20 years could still have an impact today. And great photo! This 24-page newsletter also makes great use of hashtags on each page and inspirational quotes to exemplify points on certain pages. This newsletter clearly has a vision and works hard to make it a reality.

Good presentation overall with a mix of political action and retiree news. It could be improved with more varied content. This 16-page newsletter is a complete package. The Political Action page does a commendable job of reflecting on the past year and looking toward the future. The next several pages give updates in a lively manner, especially in

the retiree section. The Toot Your Own Horn section is extremely well done and effective. State and National news pages complement the local's efforts and struggles. Please see comments for the columns submitted under best writing. Please realize you were up against fierce competition in this category. Keep up the good work for your members.

Judges' Comments:

This entry has an appealing layout and good use of graphics. But the content is basically a collection of briefs. The newsletter could be improved with more substantive articles. It's commendable to complete a 4-page newsletter for July, normally a slow time for education news. Reaching out to your members, especially on the 3rd page, is well done. The news story about the Utica Regional PAC meeting on the first page is confusing. First it notes that information would be shared about an impending ruling, yet in a follow-up sentence it notes "repercussions of this decision." The Who's In, Who's Out at NYSED seems like it is just there to fill space rather than to really give information. Members could wonder what impact those changes would have on them. The second page provides needed updates. Please see comments under the writing category for the APPR regulations article. The 3-8 Testing Update and Every Child Achieves Act Passes the US Senate are rewrites of information that are good for teachers to know if they missed in the mainstream media. The strongest part of this newsletter is reaching out to members about how to make the union and the union's newsletter better and the editor puts herself out there as a member profile. Great way to include two-way communication. This entry was up against fierce competition. Keep up the good work for your members.

Judges' Comments:

A good website with informative links. However, the home page is sparse and requires the visitor to click through in search of info. This could be improved by having more informative briefs on the home page that have the link attached to them. That way the visitor can quickly check to see what might interest him or her and be connected instantly. But make no mistake – if you take the trouble to click the link, there is much useful information there. Great slide show in the Photos section that shows a range of activities. The lack of caption information did not bother me in the least, especially in conjunction with the scrolling list you have under the Community section of the website. Might I suggest you add a line for those who might want to join your community programs and school events in that section? Especially since the only contact listed under Contact is Webmaster and you don't provide contact information under the Executive Board section. (I can understand why for a public website.) The most complete sections are Documents Section and the VOTE-COPE section. There has got to be more to MTA's history than six sentences! I also tried several different days to click on the links under MTA news but they did not work, so all I could see were headlines such as "MTA Teachers Expanding Their Roles as Leaders" or "Teacher Todd Bensley meets with Senator Ortt at the Committee of 100." This is a great start for your members but I think you could do a bit more.

Excellent writing of the many essays urging member involvement during times of strife. Strong concrete descriptions without overdoing it. Running the historical photo adds to the package. Fierce competition keeps this from getting the top writing award.

This article shows what the "reformers" are doing to kids, and why they need to be reined in. Well-done. Very good writing on a timely topic. The writer truly takes the time to help the reader understand how one decision can have such an impact as well as to try to educate the reader on the lack of reliability of cut scores. If only the mainstream press could do such a clear job explaining this. This entry is up against some amazing entries.

Judges' Comments:

This is a typed entry where the author compares her past experience of a home burglary with the current threat of being robbed by the Cuomo agenda. Very original metaphor and an effective one. But did it appear in a newsletter or just as a manuscript. If the latter, does it fit within the rules? This entry has strong descriptions and wonderful phrasing. It is very good writing. Unfortunately the slow start and long build up to the "meat" of the story must be taken into account when determining a winner against other excellent entries this year.

Judges' Comments:

This is a good wake-up call to a district that has passed shoestring budgets. Good topic but it could be improved by citing specific examples of where the penny-pinching hurts kids the most. Each new paragraph gives yet another concrete example of what must be the most horrendous learning and working conditions for students and staff. But what is the point? I can't tell if the writer is trying to urge a rejection of the mission statement, or election of new candidates to the school board, or better formulas for state funding, or settlement of a contract.

This excellent entry gives the reader a look past the curtain ("Wizard of Oz" reference intended here) and painstakingly points out the problems with growth scores. Just enough examples are given with concrete descriptions. I am certain the writer could have provided more, but shows excellent restraint. And then, just at the right time, the essay turns persuasive to urge member involvement. Great job.

Yet teachers are being blamed for testing results even though those results can be traced at least in part to the students home environment and other circumstances beyond the teacher's control. Good analysis, well-done. This is a complete package. The headline draws in the reader. The first sentence sets the stage and then the second sentence does more to capture the test score debate in its one question than many others do in whole paragraphs. This is an excellent lesson in effective writing where less is so much more. KUDOS!

This piece not only pays homage to union history, but also draws parallels to current "right-to-work" laws and an overreliance of adjunct professors. Excellent use of repetition. This writer is skilled at weaving in inspirational quotes with the need for action.

Judges' Comments:

This entry takes on Cuomo and his agenda, particularly his threat to hold hostage any school aid increase until he gets his way. The author issues a call to action that conveys a proper sense of urgency. Effective use of questions with bullet points to explain complex topics. Also entertaining how the writer draws parallels between the weather and politics and works in a "Titanic" reference just in case members did not catch the catastrophe that could await. Good persuasive job.

Local: Yorktown Congress of Teachers Category: Best Writing 1 Name of Entry: Freidrichs vs CTA Explained Publication/Website: Yorktown Congressional Record

Judges' Comments:

This is an informative article on the agency fees case before the Supreme Court. It is filled with facts and clear explanations of what agency fees are and how they came to be, as well as what non-members get from unions for their money. Some analysis would improve this otherwise solid article. This entry would be strengthened with just one more line about the implication for members, not just the union. I applaud you taking on this complex issue. Great descriptions about what unions do to support and benefit members.

Best Writing 2 – Class II

Judges' Comments:

Excellent entry that accomplishes so many things in one column. Effective use of repetition with "Actions speak louder than words" including the implied ones. Also nice touches in thanking members for their work and noting a former president. These kinds of passages go a long way toward helping folks recognize past struggles and fostering solidarity.

Judges' Comments:

This entry praises Preet Bharara as the new watchman in Albany and sees the pendulum swinging against the "three men in a room," including Gov. Cuomo and Common Core. A different take on today's battles over public education. It could be improved with a less vengeful tone though. Excellent follow-up to Mockingbird entry already submitted. It's almost like you had a sixth sense so these two essays naturally flow together. Same effective use of repetition. Same excellent descriptions. Again, excellent job.

Judges' Comments:

This entry provides an insightful look at the Gap Elimination Adjustment and how it adversely affects schools in regard to classroom numbers, faculty numbers and course offerings. Well-developed. It starts strong and ends stronger and in between is all the information the members needs with appropriate links and resources. This entry could be strengthened by a tighter word edit.

Judges' Comments:

This is a snappy bullet-point overview of Common Core Opt Out, Preet Bharara and more. It is cleverly done but sometimes the tone is more snarky than snappy. This witty piece really works as it takes a thread here, a thread there and then weaves a tapestry for the reader about current events. It entertains, it informs, it questions, and when needed, I hope it infuriates the reader to action. Great job.

Local: North Tonawanda United Teachers Category: Best Writing 2 Name of Entry: Failed to Show Progress Publication/Website: The Journal

Judges' Comments:

This typed entry is in the form of a Socratic dialogue that artfully uses the acronym SCAM instead of CORE and takes aim at the absurdities of the testing craze. Highly original, with a welcome reminder that the humanities count as well as STEM. High marks for originality and imagination. Witty, even for those who may not get the Socratic method employed here. After reading so many other entries pointing out the frustrations of the testing climate, it was refreshing to read this play featuring Plato and Socrates. Excellent historical references. Excellent "play" on words and use of acronyms.

Judges' Comments:

A somewhat personal president's message on how he came to lead the chapter, and how important it is to stand up for schools, union and jobs. It could be improved with more emphasis on the call to action and less detail on the personal observations. Very good column to the membership that strikes exactly the right tone of leading by example to urge increased involvement. This writer shows skill in varying sentence lengths to great effect. Good job.

Judges' Comments:

Interesting entry that does a great job on trying to urge members, especially those "who may not be technologically inclined" to try a new quiz-based game. Good descriptions and declarative sentences make this an easy read. I would love to see this writer take on a more complex topic.

Local: *Rondout Valley Federation of Teachers and School-Related Professionals* Category: Best Writing 2

Name of Entry: Good Teachers Don't Become Bad Ones Publication/Website: THE UNION SOUND

Judges' Comments:

This entry provides a much-needed reminder that the crisis in education doesn't lie with teachers but with childhood poverty. This theme was often mentioned in the past but seems to have been forgotten by those pushing the testing/teacher evaluation agenda. Credit this author for putting the focus where it belongs. This entry is so much more than the headline implies. An excellent analysis of the manufactured crisis in education is provided in an easy-to-read format. This entry would have been strengthened by less repetition in the bullet points. Since the lead-in line states, "Children who live in poverty suffer in ways unimaginable to those who have always had what they need," the bullet points could just say "They" instead of repeating "Children who live in poverty" for all five.

Local: Wallkill Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 2 Name of Entry: Kudos Corner Publication/Website: IMPACT Issue Date: February 2015

Judges' Comments:

This is a congratulatory message to the winner of the Martin Luther King Jr. Award for the Hudson Valley, complete with a biography of the winner. It is well presented but more of an announcement than a writing sample. This is a very good recap of a teacher's commitment to multicultural education. It covers a lot of bases but only touches on why the teacher believes so strongly in it.

Best Writing 3 – Class II

Local: Gates Chili Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Sue's Sidebar Publication/Website: The Voice Issue Date: March/April 14-15

Judges' Comments:

This entry is essentially a note of thanks to those who helped in winning a new contract. The writer uses the right tone to convey a hard-won victory but never crosses the line into boasting. Very entertaining essay into the wide-ranging emotions of a local president at negotiation perhaps the final contract of her career. It takes skill to employ such an unassuming writing style that puts the membership first.

Judges' Comments:

This entry does an admirable job explaining not just why a grievance process exists but also the ramifications if the process is not followed. This is a great service for your members. It is too bad an editor didn't catch the error in the sentence "But it's also important to understand that something as serious as a contractual violation does take time to accomplish." I am certain the writer either meant to write "rectify" instead of accomplish or perhaps shortening the sentence to "fixing a contractual violation does take time to accomplish."

Local: *Mahopac Teachers' Association* Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Business! Mankind Was My Business Publication/Website: MahopacTeachers' Asociation Blog

Judges' Comments:

An original perspective on Cuomo – as Scrooge who is visited by ghosts representing the teachers union, parents and polls. The writer avoids a purely critical article by ending with his belief that there is still hope for Andrew. Well-done. The comparisons and contrasts work so well, I really didn't want this piece to end. The writer shows great skill, but perhaps Dickens was a great teacher. Kudos!

Local: Niagara Wheatfield Teachers Association Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Jenga Cuomo Publication/Website: The Agenda

Judges' Comments:

This article contains no text, just an illustration of Cuomo either building, or tearing down, a pillar of bricks. Hard to assess its message. This is a hilarious illustration. I applaud your inventive image. It truly does say 1,000 words. This is a top contender for best cartoon.

Local: North Tonawanda United Teachers Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Fighting to Teach Publication/Website: The Journal

Judges' Comments:

This article has potential as a call to action to fight to teach. It could have had more impact if the author focused on one topic at a time, rather than weaving back and forth, and provided more facts to back up the main points of the argument. Good headline that sets the stage for a very good summary of the challenges the teaching profession faced during the year. Historical references points are well written here.

Local: Nyack Teachers Association Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Time Line of Friedrichs v. CTA Publication/Website: The Bridge

Judges' Comments:

This article provides much valuable information about the Friedrichs case, but it is mostly a timeline on what's happened so far with author analysis and perspective. This timeline does not contain original writing so I did not judge this entry on its writing. It is an excellent info graphic, however; there is such fierce competition for that award. It just falls a tad short.

Local: Port Jefferson Station Teachers Association Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Calling All Teachers Publication/Website: PJSTA PORTAL

Judges' Comments:

This is a strongly worded indictment of testing and evaluations that are devised by people who don't teach. The call for local control is good as far as it goes but it is thin on facts to back up the rhetoric. Very good call to action against state growth scores. This writer shows great skill in culling down 10 years of concerns into this insightful analysis. This essay, for the most part, does a great job making its point. This entry would have been strengthened by a few simple edits to several overly long sentences.

Local: Rondout Valley Federation of Teachers and School-Related Professionals Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Persistence and Perseverance Prevail

Judges' Comments:

This article supplies some of the big names behind the testing/evaluation craze. While that is helpful, and often overlooked by many critics, the writer loses credibility by misspelling Murdoch and engaging in name-calling – Cuomo as bully, emperor, etc. Very good retrospective of the trials and tribulations. It opens strong. The writing is good and is strongest when sticking to just one point. It just gets bogged down in clichés or overused phrases. Verb tenses also get mixed up, which can confuse the reader. This entry also ends well with a strong call to action.

Local: Wallkill Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 3 Name of Entry: Rumors and Fairytales Publication/Website: IMPACT Issue Date: February 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry does a good job of demolishing the rumors and myths about testing/evaluations and opting-out. The presentation could have been improved with some graphics to break up blocks of type, although the layout itself is well done. This entry does an excellent job of separating fact from fiction in an engaging manner. References to fairytales and monsters go a long way in telling a story. If this column could not calm the masses, I don't know what could. This entry could be strengthened by a tighter word edit, but overall a good job.

Best Writing 4 – Class II

Local: Gates Chili Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: President's Message Publication/Website: The Voice Issue Date: Jan/Feb 14-15

Judges' Comments:

This president's message contains good suggestions in dealing with the Cuomo agenda and education budget. A solid call to action. Very good persuasive essay. The writer sets up the problems and offers the solutions in an effective manner. Solid concrete descriptions help inform the reader as well as the writer clearly announcing when a section is just his opinion. Keep up the good work.

Local: Lynbrook Teachers Association Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: LTA President Candidate Platforms Publication/Website: LTA Examiner

Judges' Comments:

The entry consists of a summary of the platforms showing where candidates stand on various issues. Informational but not a writing sample as such, as the candidates themselves do most of the talking. It is unclear whether this qualifies as original writing, as it appears the words come from the candidates. I will say that graphically this is a very good comparison of the two candidates. As an informational graphic it does an excellent job, but it faces fierce competition in this category.

Local: *Mahopac Teachers' Association* Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: The Face of Mahopac's Public Education Publication/Website: MahopacTeachers' Asociation Blog

Judges' Comments:

This entry is mainly a report on after-school programs. It shows how teachers, assistants and parents have come together to make the programs work, but it is mostly reporting facts, not original writing. The program this article references is a crown jewel, but that fact is buried until halfway into the story. The writer has great information and details to share, but just takes too long to get there. The first paragraph might hook more readers with a simple statement along the lines of "Just think of what we can achieve when we all work together." This isn't a fantasy world. It happens every day after school at the Mahopac Middle School where 240 students enrolled in 11 different programs etc.... Then, aspects of that first paragraph would work well in the conclusion. I hope this helps.

Judges' Comments:

This entry consists only of a graphic – I Love Public Education – valentines. Attractive but not a writing sample. What fun and inventive ways to engage your readers. The graphics are bold and simple. The slogans are clever. This entry is better suited for the social media category. It is a strong contender for best community outreach, best info graphic, etc.

Name of Entry: The Governor's Agenda: How it Attacks Teachers, Students & Education

Publication/Website: The Bridge

Judges' Comments:

This is a look at the governor's agenda and a countdown of the attacks on public education that the agenda contains. Hard-hitting and specific, although the tone need not be so hostile. Commendable entry of taking on the large and complex issue of the state budget and trying to explain portions of it to your members. However, this entry gives credence by repeating, even quoting, the Governor's proposals, claims and website. Yes, the writer follows up with each section to give another viewpoint, but that comes after Cuomo's case is made. Take for example "Proposal #43 would make it easier, fairer and faster to remove ineffective teachers from the classroom according to Governor Cuomo." That is followed by eight sentences explaining the proposal. The writer does provide five lengthy paragraphs to explain the union's views of the proposals, but at times ends up further explaining Cuomo's proposals.

Judges' Comments:

This entry provides a good contrast between shallow efforts that union members might make to advance a union cause and so-called deep organizing that shows real commitment to that cause. This is coupled with a call for union members to build trusting relationships with members and parents. Well-done, very positive, constructive points. I think this entry would be strengthened by sticking to just one or two topics at a time and a much tighter word edit.

Local: Rondout Valley Federation of Teachers and School-Related Professionals Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Dare to be Divergent! Publication/Website: THE UNION SOUND

Judges' Comments:

This entry uses the Divergent series to make the point that an APPR score doesn't measure how good a teacher is. Good points well taken, although not everyone might be aware of Divergent's relevance. This essay cleverly compares a popular book series to the APPR requirements. Excellent examples are provided and varying sentence lengths are used effectively. This clear call to action is a strong entry.

Judges' Comments:

This recap of a rally gave a good general overview of a rally. The writer covers the basics of what, who, when and where. This rally was on a Friday. Quotes from any of the more than 60 members about why they chose to be there at the end of a long workweek would strengthen this entry.

Judges' Comments:

The president's message uses a recent retirement party as an example of the kind of social gatherings that teachers should participate in more regularly. Her point that these functions are ways for faculty to bond is well taken. This writer pays tribute to retirees as well as expresses concern about increasing a "generational connection that all educators share." Detailed descriptions explain why this is much more than a challenge to those staying in the profession to become more social. This column gives the reader a lot to ponder and I found myself thinking more about its message than many of the other more "heavy" topics such as funding, testing and such.

Judges' Comments:

This entry is an endorsements postcard. While it performs an important service for members it is not a writing sample as such. Sometimes simple is not just better, it is best. There is no second-guessing. No questions. This postcard is direct and to the point. Well-done.

Judges' Comments:

This entry makes a point that is often overlooked in other articles about classroom research – namely, that the best research is done in the classroom every day when teachers get to know their students individually and serve them as individuals. That's something blind testing and evaluations can't match. Excellent descriptions. Excellent details. Kudos.

Local: Nyack Teachers Association Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: Fight Back NTA Says "No!" To Gov. Cuomo's Budget Publication/Website: The Bridge Issue Date: Spring 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry is a complete package. It starts with a great headline to draw in the reader. The accompanying photo is lively and shows active members. The writing gets right to the point and answers all the who, what, where, when and why questions needed in a true news article. An added bonus is the call to action to sign petitions and other actions against the budget. Good job.

Judges' Comments:

Give credit to this author's candor. The entry is an all-out slam against NYSUT as a topdown organization with power-hungry leaders. Given those sweeping allegations the author has an obligation to provide facts to support them, but does not. This entry is much like the You Are the Union entry. It takes too long to get to the heart of the matter. The strongest writing is the description of what the PJSTA did to support Zephyr Teachout. Descriptions of more democratic unionism follow and this writer does end on a strong note.

The author skillfully uses the documentary to support a call for New York State lawmakers to pass the NY DREAM Act. Good job. This article gives excellent insight into the complex social issue of immigration. Refreshing use of quotes by both teachers and students throughout the column and three explanatory paragraphs of the DREAM Act help inform the reader. The writing could have been structured better as the essay discusses a student-created documentary at length, and then goes back to the documentary after discussing legislation, and then again goes back to legislation.

Photo coverage of the welcome back event could have been improved with some photo captions, but perhaps you all know each other. You must know how much was raised in the TV raffle so why not add that? Retirees get space as well and what an adorable photo! I would have liked to see Herr Beck without sunglasses and more of him! Extremely well done back page, cramming a lot of info in a graphically pleasing way. Clearly you have a variety of members contributing to your newsletter and the writers get a credit. The cover page sets the tone with a clean look and do you change the question at the bottom of the left panel each issue? That is a great idea! The president's column does a good job explaining the bargaining process to the membership. You do so much right! The column could have been improved by using more specific language (which is often shorter). Every article on programs, charitable events, compassion assembly, etc., completely covers the event with great descriptions. Even your coverage of the Ugly Sweater contest in just two sentences explains why, and that it raises funds for district graduates. Compared to the rest of the publication, the different fonts and sizes on the Colonial Village page varied differently from the other pages. Really nice back page. Overall, very enjoyable read.

Interesting that I judged this newsletter Mar. 22, a day after the new chancellor for the Board of Regents pledging, "practice should inform policy," not the other way around. *The Journal* cover 17 months earlier with the headline "Better Times are Coming" predicts, "soon the education pendulum will begin to swing the other way." Kudos to the writer for bringing perspective to fed-up members.

Other articles are well done, and each has a distinct voice. Extremely insightful (and brave) Student Evaluation topic. Rather than just reacting to Cuomo's proposal of adding student input, this article investigates and adds to the discussion.

I did not understand the full-page photo of people's backs opposite the page of Keep Our Union Strong. I doubt it was the regional conference. Perhaps it was to go with the previous article, "Opening Day?

Yes, it has journalistic writing flaws, but the details and explanation make up for that. The two-page scholarly article about ADHD and physical activity was extremely useful and I am not a teacher. Yes, perhaps this info might have been better offered in a Q and A format. But if that is not an option, this level of detail for your members who most likely have kids on all these medications is a great service. Because it ends with the author offering additional help, it makes me think this is a staffer, so your folks must know how to contact her. The photo back page is nicely laid out although you should have reconsidered your caption. Aren't those RVFT & SRP members joining with allies? Generally in photos with fewer than four people, it's great to identify the folks, so it would have been nice to have names with four of the pics. You would have room without the bullhorn graphic at the left bottom corner and then bump down the Cuomo report card photo and switch the rating photo with the marching with sign photo. Scrolling through recent content was not just extremely interesting but also pleasing to read. The video for the Students Not Scores forum was a tad dark, but kudos for putting up any videos as that can really take a lot of computer time for loading. The second video wouldn't load for me. This entire site was easy to navigate and really made sense, except The PJSTA Letter to the Community, while well-written, is dated February 2015 and is the second choice, even before the About section. Why the PJSTA Wears Red for Public Ed is also extremely well-written and is the last choice. I would suggest making that your 2nd choice and moving the community letter down. Given you have excellent photos on the main site, how about a photo of your officers? Either a group photo or individually. This is an extremely good site that seeks to increase participation and organizing.

I was surprised that was not password protected. The site is not updated regularly, only when there is news to report. I found the Labor Press Briefs an interesting section although there were only two items from *The New* York Times in it. Both excellent choices for a union website. It's clear this local is struggling to settle a contract and that takes much time. Excellent strategies to have a student letter included and the Jan. 29th call to sign a letter to the president and the board.

Judges' Comments:

Drawing a comparison between arbitration and mediation, and noting how the latter might be a better choice in some labor situations could improve this entry. Attractive layout. This writing does an excellent job of working in scholarly views with current events and homage to Alice's Restaurant. Also, skilled use of varying sentence length and descriptive phrasing. Engaging, fun to read, perceptive. A top contender.

Judges' Comments:

This article is an extremely well done and thoughtful analysis of the Friedrichs court case. Also, I applaud devoting so much space to this complex issue. Having said that, crediting others would have strengthened this entry's research, for which it relied on heavily.

Captions would have strengthened this entry. If you don't think there is room, realize that some of the info from the article could be put into the caption.

Judges' Comments:

The information is interesting and well presented. It could have been improved with a greater application of past struggles to today's battles. Excellent accompanying graphic. Judges' Comments:

This writer clearly knows how to persuade. Simple clear examples are used effectively. Points are made and then the writer moves on. This is a delight to read. Also clear strategies are laid out in the conclusion. Excellent job.

This reads more like minutes from a meeting and in such "buries the lead." More than halfway into the article is the news that the acting deans told the board of directors it was okay to devastate the programs they headed at the college. (Yes I oversimplified.) Thinking about conveying to the reader what news happened at the meeting would strengthen this entry.

The front office is the front lines so if the paperwork is not ready, schools just don't work!

Judges' Comments:

What college teacher doesn't remember the MOOCs craze? This article is a welcome perspective on that mania, which has eased somewhat, but warns that wealthy and influential people are pushing hard for more online courses so that teachers can teach even more students than they do now. The writer also warns that online courses may someday be for the poor, while only the rich can afford a campus education. Well done – a wakeup call that should not be ignored. Exceptional headline! Excellent analysis of the online course issue. Well-researched and well referenced. Using Godzilla as a touchstone throughout this essay works extremely well. A pleasure to read.

Your concern for members is a lovely touch. Great job.

Judges' Comments:

Could this be the first headline that notes teachers are more than a test score? It's quite creative and I do wish you had started off this column along those lines. Something like, "As we all worked to establish routines with our students this month, I saw example after example of your hard work to make sure it was a great start to the school year. The calendar tested us, but time and again, you aced that exam, getting students and your classrooms back in the groove."

Judges' Comments:

The author draws a great contrast between members of the City College community who rushed to fight segregation in Selma during the 1960s, while City College itself was lily white. Good insight and perspective on the past and now, and how some of those early anti-segregation protestors remained behind to live and work among the South's black community. Well-done, but clearly an example of professional writing. Top contender for the best article about labor history. Also, for a news article this has excellent graphic design. Excellent use of historical photographs. Excellent subheads in the writing. Perhaps its only flaw is the headline. It doesn't really draw the reader in. Excellent use of quotes. The writer does an excellent job of weaving in recollections and articles from 50 years ago (so of course it helps to have such great historical records) with current interviews. What a gem the Somerstein interview was! Great job.

Judges' Comments:

This entry could have been improved if the author had expanded on his last point – namely that the charter schools haven't lived up to their promise. Providing more research where charters are a threat to public education would have strengthened this entry. Otherwise it's just a claim that is not backed up. There are many examples of for-profit companies putting profits above the education of students. Use at least one of them. Or at least cite those that do such a bad job of educating students the state has to close them. These figures are available.

This entry is up against fierce competition so realize we have to find weaknesses in articles for the top awards. So in this case, what bothers me is why is there a photo of Wendy Hord? The writer notes in the first paragraph she is part of the health and safety committee. But then I noticed the byline. So then, clearly this health and safety specialist is the person creating the Workplace Bullying Toolkit and that could have been a great connection to make. Please realize that is nitpicky and you did a great job.

The theme and tone are right-on but the article could be improved by relying less on reporting and more on highlighting the state's hypocrisy.

This is an interesting angle on the Friedrichs case before the Supreme Court – namely, that religiously aligned groups are supporting the plaintiffs in what is an apparent effort to bolster private schools over publicly funded ones by depriving teacher unions of agency fees. Very good job by an investigative journalist, but the question is whether investigative journalism is appropriate for a writing contest. As noted in the Editor's note, this is part of a series on the Friedrichs case. It is so well written and then when I get to the end I see why. The writer is an investigate journalist who specializes in such coverage. I certainly applaud this local for providing this information to its members. I don't feel right about nominating this entry for a top award, however, I will advocate for the entire series to be recognized for best news coverage.

Local: Smithtown Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: As it Relates to Us Publication/Website: FACULTY FOCUS Issue Date: December 2015

Judges' Comments:

This is really an article about an article – one in *Rolling Stone* magazine about looting a union pension. The topic is a good one but the writer relies heavily on merely citing the *Rolling Stone* article. And nowadays any mention of *Rolling Stone* brings up a question of that magazine's credibility. This writer provides an excellent summary of a crisis facing public employees who are busy fighting education reform. The writer does an excellent job citing others' work and then begins to draw the connection to the possibility of a Constitutional Convention in New York State. This entry would have been strengthened by the information about how New York pension funds have a board that includes teacher-members and a retired member, and a state comptroller to keep the funds out of the hands of a governor. There would have been room without the graphic of the man reading a newspaper, which doesn't add to the article.

Local: Union of Clerical, Administrative & Technical Staff at NYU Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Health Insurance on the Rocks Publication/Website: Momentum

Judges' Comments:

This article raises a point about the Affordable Care Act that is too often overlooked – namely, that some insurances have such high deductibles as to be insurance in name only. The writer also lambastes NYU administrators as "shameless liars" and notes the huge discrepancy between NYU's surplus and its cries of tight budgets. Good effort but name calling - shameless liars - diminishes the writer's credibility. This is an excellent package. Easy to read graphically. The headline draws readers into the story. The photo pairs nicely and even provides info to another story on a different page. This writer clearly makes points about the complex issue of health insurance with specific appropriate examples. Not only is this sentence — "Make no mistake that what NYU has done to faculty/administrators, they will want to do the same to your health insurance options when our contract expires in 2017."— so skilled, the next sentences are just as clear and logical about what the union is facing. Perhaps all that is missing is what the union is doing to fight it, but I bet that is on that other page referenced in the photo.

Local: United University Professions - Empire State College Chapter Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Paying it Forward Publication/Website: UUP ESC Chapter Newsletter Excellence in Unity Issue Date: Fall 2015

Judges' Comments:

Good perspective on what opportunities will be lost if the wrong candidates get elected. This column does a great job of setting the reader up to get angry about how union members are portrayed in the media, and then provides strategies of how the writer copes. The writer skillfully weaves in an invitation to work with the union to identify more. Excellent use of repetition. This entry could have been stronger by adopting an editorial "we" once in a while. See how "We all know this" is stronger than "I know you all know this." Keep at it.

Local: United University Professions - Farmingdale Chapter Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Fun With Bugs at COARM Publication/Website: UNIFIER Issue Date: Nov 2015

Judges' Comments:

This writer finds ways to make a union meeting interesting! Even better, she provides specific information to members about what NOT to do at the risk of putting state health coverage at risk. This entry would have been a top contender if it had done that with at least two more areas. What is one interesting bug fact that made you reconsider using pesticides? And when should the retirees apply for the vision and dental plans. It won't take more space and might even take fewer words. Great job and keep at it.

Local: United University Professions - Oswego Chapter Category: Best Writing 4 Name of Entry: Oswego Adjuncts Organize Publication/Website: IN TOUCH... Issue Date: Spring 2015

Judges' Comments:

This is an excellent recap about the plight of contingent and adjunct faculty. Nice use of photos and excellent captioning that gives additional information not repeated in the story. Great package.

Best Writing 5 – Class III

Local: Buffalo Teachers Federation Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: Cuomo Indicted on Five Charges as 1,000 Participate in Mock Trial in Kleinhans Music Hall Publication/Website: PROVOCATOR Issue Date: April 2015

Judges' Comments:

The idea of a mock trial to indict Gov. Cuomo is original and instructive at the same time. Overall it is well done but words like "brutalized our students" go a bit far. This would be just as effective, if not more so, without the strident language. Too bad the lead sentence just recaps the headline – or perhaps the headline was written first? This is certainly a most creative way to get your point across. Excellent use of photographs, although perhaps it would have been better to use fewer and then provide more space to testimony? I would have been interested to read what the state Teacher of the Year testified to as well as college professors and principals. The former school board member quote is most apt, but it's an interesting choice that is the only witness quoted when the article appeared to have room for at least four more lines.

Local: Faculty Association of Suffolk Community College Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: What we can learn from Zimbabwean orphans about social justice and collective action Publication/Website: The WORD

Judges' Comments:

This is a very moving account of Zimbabwean orphans visiting the campus and explanation of a program called ZimKids. That alone makes for interesting reading but it is what the author adds that makes this entry stand out. She relates the orphans' struggle with her early life, which was harsh but not as severe as the orphans' experiences. But also draws a link to how unionism helped her and others like her to rise above her circumstances. Very well done and heartfelt. This excellent entry starts strong and just gets stronger. A pleasure to read. Perhaps its only flaw is that I don't know where Bulawayo is. Excellent descriptive language paired with specific concrete examples is done well but then the writer skillfully reveals her inner struggles and emotions.

Local: *Mount Vernon Federation of Teachers* Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: What Has the Union Done For Me Lately? Publication/Website: The Agenda

Judges' Comments:

This writer does a great job of providing not just information to the members, but also strategies they could also use. This is an excellent example of a local responding specifically to one specialized area of the membership, which also benefits the students and the entire learning community. I especially liked the writer's way of taking the moral high ground over a contentious testing issue. Teachers should not be forced to consider needy students a liability could become a rallying cry. Excellent work.

Local: Nassau Community College Federation of Teachers Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: Foundation Foil Publication/Website: NCCFT Blog Issue Date: April 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry is labeled a blog, so there is a question whether it has been entered in the correct category. While I applaud this local for providing the space to run legal proceedings, you really should have summarized for the reader especially since first you lost the case and then you won the case. Or perhaps that was your intent? Regardless, this is not even a recap of the legal proceedings. It doesn't really qualify as an entry for this contest as it doesn't contain original writing.

Local: Patchogue-Medford Congress of Teachers Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: PMHS Senior Leads Renovation of Soup Kitchen Publication/Website: Connection Issue Date: 3/2015

Judges' Comments:

This is a good profile of a student who led the renovation of a soup kitchen. However, there is a dark blue background for the type that makes it almost impossible to read. This is an excellent entry of a worthy cause. Excellent timeline photos accompany the article. Because this entry is up against such fierce competition I must note that the verb tense changes were distracting. Going from past to present, sometimes even in the same paragraph distracted from this otherwise very good entry. This article goes above and beyond to really detail how this senior student went about all that was needed for this project. Good work!

Local: Professional Staff Congress/CUNY Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: Wikipedia, Women and Art Publication/Website: Clarion Issue Date: March 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry is an article on the low number of women who edit or write for Wikipedia. It could have been improved if the author had been more analytical. The actual headline is "Chipping away at Wikipedia's gender gap," which is a great head made even better with a subhead of The Art Feminism Edit-a-thon. Excellent entry and this is a top contender for Best Feature Story. This article actually made me care about Wikipedia with its vivid descriptions and specific examples. While many articles are well-researched and referenced, this writer's work is stellar. Perhaps starting with the information from the second paragraph could have strengthened it, but that is an extremely minor quibble. Excellent job.

Local: Smithtown Teachers' Association Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: Governor Cuomo's WAR on Public Education Publication/Website: FACULTY FOCUS Issue Date: March 2015

Judges' Comments:

This is an eye-opening article that claims Cuomo wants to discredit public schools so he can replace them with charter schools favored by his wealthy backers. Good as far as it goes, but it needs to have facts to back up the allegations. This editorial certainly is persuasive and really takes on a lot. That is unfortunately its downfall. This writer works very hard and I appreciate cramming a lot of information into one article. Realize that complex issues often require simpler sentences. For example, each reform listed also includes the expected real impact on education. It would be easier for the reader if each long sentence were broken into two. Also, this is one example where repetition (of portions of the intro again in the conclusion) is not used as effectively as other entries. Please keep at it. This writer does a very good job.

Local: Union of Clerical, Administrative & Technical Staff at NYU Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: Sexton's Stats Publication/Website: Momentum

Judges' Comments:

This entry takes an up-close look at the outgoing NYU president's lavish salary, bonus, and other perks, all based on IRS data. The numbers are jaw dropping but there should have been more text to accompany them. This is a top contender for Best Info Graphic. This is a great example where a listing of stats works far better than written words. This works on so many levels.

Judges' Comments:

Excellent entry. This writer does a stellar job explaining to members what a new organization structure by the employer means to employees as well as what rights and responsibilities they have. This article works on so many levels; I hope it is shared with all unions as a primer of clear, explanatory writing. Great job.

Local: United University Professions - Farmingdale Chapter Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: Governor's Goals: 2015-2016: Wisconsin and New York Publication/Website: UNIFIER Issue Date: Feb 2015

Judges' Comments:

The photos of Gov. Cuomo and Wisconsin Gov. Walker – both grinning – is worth a thousand words. The warning that what happened to unions in Wisconsin can happen here in New York is well taken. This writer cleverly ties together two different states by comparing similar leadership styles and budget proposals. Very few flaws in this entry. (Look at the captions. Why repeat Governor twice in each?) Also, be aware the governor's State of the State address and his executive budget are two different things.

Local: United University Professions - Oswego Chapter Category: Best Writing 5 Name of Entry: Adjunct Hustle Publication/Website: IN TOUCH... Issue Date: Fall 2015

Judges' Comments:

This article on adjuncts and how they must often take multiple jobs to get by focuses on a topic that is only now getting the attention it deserves. The author rightly calls on adjuncts to make their voices heard by standing with the union in the fight for fair wages. Excellent entry. This writer skillfully uses a whole variety of techniques to make this a pleasure to read. This entry makes me care to know if the adjunct was asked back. This entry does far more than inform, it provides a depth of understanding to the reader as well as a breadth. Excellent work.

Local: Buffalo Teachers Federation Category: General Excellence Publication/Website: PROVOCATOR Issue Date: February 2015

Judges' Comments:

This entry contains a contrast of note – mainly a high critical article on Gov. Cuomo and his agenda, contrasted with another article that recalls how the governor's father, Mario, was a friend of public education when he was in office. Nicely done. The issue also contains articles on a weekend contract hearing, executive committee appointments and other items of interest. In all, a good mix. The newsletter could be improved by shrinking its size, which gives it a tabloid look. This local clearly cares about informing a rather large membership on a wide variety of issues. With all this local faces, information is a strong tool to increase participation and solidarity among the members. The six profiles of new exec committee members are well done and I applaud you for running photographs. The varying graphic treatments made me wonder though. Why are some indented and others not? The more I look at this publication, I realize what a huge undertaking it is, and then notice the masthead. Is it really done with only three newsletter members? Or are these staffers whose only job is to put out this publication? This must weigh in my decision on general excellence. Also, excellent use of rerunning information from other sources to provide more information. Why redo something that works?

The continuation of the teacher center information to the next page is just a smidge confusing. It's essential for unions to include a Contract Corner and this is well done. The Meeting Dr. Wortham article made me fear for this local's continued interaction with a new leader!

(Especially since this is a March issue and the state budget is due April 1, it's a missed opportunity to not remind members about what your local is doing on that front.) This is thin on content and could be improved by adding longer substantive articles of interest.

This entry has the look of a professional journal. Excellent entry. Fantastic front-page graphically. You are so fortunate to have such wonderful choices in photography as perhaps the photo across pages 6-7 could have also worked. Excellent articles all around. Excellent short notes, news coverage of the low-wage fight, tuition hikes, social justice, the list goes on.

The "News" section of the website was updated at least six different times in March that I could tell. Each entry was strong. The photo and video galleries are well done and engaging. Great job.

Information is clear; photos are engaging, although a tad dark. Check your settings. See how other local's photos seem to pop off the page. I love that suggestion box although the options I clicked on sent me back to the home page. Documents and forms are easy for members to find. It did not appear this website was updated often, mainly with adding The Agenda newsletter. While I thought the video about VOTE-COPE was good, I think there is some missed opportunity to put more information up there, like how do folks participate in a drive? What do you do with your rebates?

This is an easy to navigate website and I especially appreciate the ease of linking contact info right to the person's name. I was able to access most areas of the site. Everything is so well thought out. Photos are engaging, and I liked the way they were grouped by event. I love that suggestion box although the options I clicked on sent me back to the home page. Documents and forms are easy for members to find. This local updated its website at least weekly in February and March.

The site could be improved with a more uniform appearance — that is, some links take the visitor to huge headlines, while others, such as the Diane Ravitch link, have much smaller typefaces in headline and text. There should be a happy medium. This website did not appear to be updated often in March. I finally found links at the bottom. The outreach event calendar for 2016 needs to have dates attached. The blogs are links to other blogs, no original content. The political action urges members to email their Regents in September 2015. All of this needs to be updated.

Judges' Comments:

This website offers members all the information they need and then some. That's what a good website should do, of course, but this site could be improved with a better design. The current site requires visitors to click through individual pages to access information, a process that can take a while. And every page has the same format – huge headlines and big body type. It would help visitors if the site had a table of contents on the home page, so visitors could see in advance which pages to click for which topic. And the page layouts should have some variety to them. Not everything merits a big headline and big body type. This is a good tool to share information with members, however, little original content is generated. Even the About Us page goes to NYSUT.org. Photos have not been updated in years. Also watch spelling in headlines.

This entry would be strengthened with more frequent updates.

Judges' Comments:

This site is easily accessed and contains much useful information. The home page is attractive and inviting. It could be improved by checking on some of the links, which can be tricky to access, and to use fewer download links in favor of direct ones. I was able to access the site. This is a bright website and easy to navigate. The majority of updates appear to be photos, but even there the rotating photos reference a 2011 event, two 2014 events and an undated event in Albany. The newest item in News (other than the excellent newsletter) was from Nov. 2015.

Judges' Comments:

This website is loaded with information. Members are kept informed on a variety of issues relating to their contract and also other items that are summarized on the home page with links to more information. The site could be improved with more graphics and better use of them as well as photos. So every time I went on there was a notice UUP was about to be evicted. When I tried to find out why, it took me to a solidarity pledge. That is confusing. The site appears to be updated frequently, although it notes an update of 11/10/16. So it can time travel? I was able to access the negotiations updates, which certainly must be of most interest. It had not been updated since Feb. 18 and Dec. 16 before that.

Then the Stay Informed section – Jeepers. If you promise that these issues will directly affect you on a daily basis it should have something more current than a 2014 Reclaim the Promise letter followed by a December 2013 Stay Informed document (and it just gets older from there.)
