The reader is left as uninformed on that important point as they were before they began to read this.

President's column/Scalia passing - An important issue but be careful with big issues in a local newsletter...Be sure to draw a connection to what it might mean locally and that can be difficult to do without deft presentation of the context that avoids getting into the weeds.

It seems inadequate. Once a writer hangs their story on a pivotal question, she has an obligation to deal with it directly, rather than wandering off a bit and gazing back wistfully. If no answer can be found, that should be clearly conceded.

Summer leadership - Another informational article that would be stronger as a feature offering fuller context and perspective...the first person account touches on learning about the importance of what leadership means in today's world and would be even stronger with a more detailed explanation about what was learned, why it's relevant and how it is transferable. Additional perspective with quotes and testimonial from other participants in the program might help deliver this message more effectively.

It seems like a story that defends and even advocates hypersensitivity to word choices, should try to avoid using language that's coded or just a kind of slang or jargon. Nevertheless, it's a worthwhile effort because it ultimately calls for teachers to be caring, accepting and supportive and to model that behavior for their students.

An informative and valuable article with practical information and suggestions. It would be even stronger with a lede that delivers a more direct message about why this is something that members should care about, particularly in the local.

The information is mostly correct, although the writer fails to distinguish between dues payers and fee payers, with the former being members of the union and the latter being those who are in the bargaining unit represented by the union but who decline to become members.

Good background information on very important topics. They would be even stronger with a more direct description about how they might affect individual members locally.

The comments from the panelists that are provided here are well said and very worthy of sharing with the readers of this publication, but printing such large excerpts uses far more space and more of a reader's time than necessary. The reporter's job is to communicate it more succinctly and directly than a speaker.

A worthwhile topic and some valuable perspective. The feature would be stronger with a clearer lede and some fuller context to connect it more quickly to the shared interests of the individual local membership.

Some fuller context and background would be helpful. Perhaps an editor's note laying out the circumstances and some of the relevant facts might be appropriate and effective.

It is articulate and avoids self-pity and whining without straining to find humor where there is none.

A moving and relevant firsthand account that connects for all of us. A sincere and straightforward tone enhances the credibility of the message. There are nice references to details and a local sense of community, but the message is universal.

It could be strengthened for the local readership by connecting it even more directly to the local and their continuing struggles and experiences.

An interesting and sincere first-person account that provides important perspective. It might be stronger with some context, perhaps in the form of an editor's note to better set the stage for what the article is all about. It might also benefit from a closer connection to why this story is still so relevant in today's world, and connect it to the obligation that each of us has to try to make this world a better place.

The piece offers some context and explanation at the very end...Presenting this information at the beginning would strengthen the purposefulness and create better understanding. Working in some appreciation for the way these activities strengthen the union, example-by-example, would also be valuable.

Judges' Comments:

Much to admire in this first person account of self-discovery. Lots of nice detail and insight. The piece would be stronger with some streamlining, sharper focus and a closer connection between how the self-discovery through running actually does make the writer a better teacher. More detail/explanation around that would strengthen the appeal to others to pursue similar activities.

A very worthwhile informational article with important purpose. Some context about the challenges that teachers face, and the prevalent circumstances of youth in crisis, would be a valuable addition along with some vivid detail to make this more real for the reader. No need to apologize to the reader for addressing a relevant and serious topic...use the opening to connect them to issues that teachers encounter in very acute ways.

Judges' Comments:

This is a news report on an appeal for members in Buffalo to donate money to help students in Flint, Michigan. It is a factual story written in the third person and quoting the union president's request for help to support these students who have been exposed to heavy lead content in their drinking water for years. The story doesn't mention that fact and the writer apparently assumes the local's members are already well aware of that circumstance. The writer includes the fact that the teachers union in Flint replayed the voicemail offer from the Buffalo teachers at their executive council meeting. That simple inclusion helps to elevate and personalize this news brief.

Straightforward basic information. Needs a stronger hook in the lede to provide context and connection for the reader.

Judges' Comments:

This is a well-written third-person news account of a rally for student needs in Buffalo. It includes quotes and mentions the mutual solidarity expressed between the members of the Buffalo Teachers Federation and the Verizon workers who held their own rally immediately following the BTF event.

A lot of facts and information, which would be more purposeful with a stronger lede offering context and connection for the membership. What is the takeaway for advancing the teachers' cause? Quotes from the participants, including many of the guests and supporters would be welcome, particularly if they helped to present the story and give it resonance.

Judges' Comments:

This is a good third-person news report that makes good use of direct quotes. It reports on a large contract rally and the events that occurred just before and after it.

A lot of information sharing the who, what, when and where of the story; It would be strengthened by explaining more about why it matters for the individual member. Quotes from the participants and supporters would help to tell the story and make it more real.

Local: Commack Teachers Association Category: Best Writing Name of Entry: One Teacher's View: Achieving the Dream: Athletics for All Publication/Website: The Commack Teacher Issue Date: 20161017

Judges' Comments:

This is first-person advocacy, more than it is a news report. The writer is part of the story that is about a program to involve students with physical disabilities in athletic competitions that he began and still actively supports. He makes the story interesting and expresses persuasive observations about the students who participate in the program.

A valuable and informative first-person account of an important program There is a lot of good information that could be even stronger with more detail about the "nitty-gritty" of the training and competition that these athletes and their coaches experience. Some perspective that offers more specific insight to the benefits for the individuals involved and how that in turn makes a positive impact on the school and community would be welcome and offer a fuller appreciation of this program.

Judges' Comments:

This story by the local union president is written in the first-person, but is meant to be an analytical and objective look at the facts regarding the effects of declining enrollment and funding on the union's members. He goes beyond looking at the present, by presenting data and a well-reasoned analysis of the factors that led to the declines. He also uses charts and tables of data to clearly show members what to expect in the coming five to 10 years. It's refreshing to see a union leader take such an objective and penetrating look at such an important situation and share it so effectively with the union's members. This is exceptionally good work.

An ambitious effort to make sense of a wide range of issues based on a demographic report. Be careful about overwhelming the reader with information. Sometimes breaking stories like this down to a main overview and several sidebars can be helpful. You might also try distilling the information into bullet points or factoids for easier understanding.

Judges' Comments:

This is a very good post-election message from the union president to the members. He avoids partisan politics and personal attacks. He does not name names or disparage one political party or official. He states how leaders in both parties have taken positions that threaten the things he and his members need and value in their careers and personal lives. He asks all members, regardless of their politics, to join him in defending these things they have worked and fought to achieve in the attacks that surely lie ahead. It's hard to imagine how he could improve upon this message.

A sincere effort to provide some context on the national political scene. Efforts of this kind can often be polarizing despite good intentions. It is often best for union leaders to

focus in a more granular way on issues in the workplace and how they affect the working environment, work load, impact on children, etc. These may in fact be connected to the national political issues but it can be more effective to approach them in a way that connects more directly to the individual member and perhaps helps them to see it differently.

Judges' Comments:

This is more like a letter to members than a news story. It appears to be a news story in many respects because it presents the facts of a complex issue and puts them in a time context. It is written in the third person until the very last paragraph when it switches to the first person, but it is not an opinion piece and it is not clear whether it is just a news story or a standing column. The story has strong writing that presents complex information with reasonable clarity and directness. A real news story should also contain some quotes and reactions from members about how this change in policy will affect them.

A lot of important information here. Try to avoid jargon and acronyms in headlines. If using acronyms in a piece, write it out fully the first time and then use the acronym. This is about the organization of this information and what is most important for the audience to know? Use that as your lede to draw them in and then try to explain in the simplest possible terms. The denser the information, the more difficult for the reader and often they won't read it at all if they zone out at first blush. Often you can distill information into bullet points or factoids to make it easier to understand and streamline the article.

Judges' Comments:

Teachers can and must educate other voters about the critical issues and stakes in a general election. That is the core message presented here in a persuasive and well-reasoned argument.

There's a lot of good information here about some challenging big picture issues. The challenge with helping people better understand the big picture is connecting to what it means for them. Approaching the issues presented here in the context of what they might mean for the individual member in this school district might be a helpful approach to moving minds.

A lot of important technical information presented here. Be careful to try to simplify it and also to distill down what is most important for the member to know.

Judges' Comments:

This is a strong opinion/advocacy piece urging members to vote in the general election. The writer makes a good case for voting and points out the stakes for members of the local and all of organized labor. He also reminds members of their combined voting power at the polls.

There is a continuing challenge for union leaders to stress the importance of voting and being concerned about political and public policy issues. These are critically important but can also be extremely polarizing within the union. It can be difficult to strike the right tone without being strident or pushing the individual member in a particular direction. People have to figure that out for themselves and they don't want the union telling them what to do. A good approach is to connect issues directly to real life in the local school district and encourage people to support candidates who will support what we care about. There are elements of that approach towards the end of this article that might serve well as a template for future messages.

Judges' Comments:

This is a personal tribute and thanks from the local union president to his fellow officers who are retiring. It is sincere and personal and should be appreciated by those who are leaving.

Nice recognition on the retirement of some individuals who have been the backbone of the local. The column might be strengthened with specific anecdotes about the individuals that capture their personality and express how it has contributed to the community of the local. Offer some of their pet phrases, serious or humorous examples of something they did or even a valedictory quote from them. Let the individuals emerge from the recognition.

Judges' Comments:

Timing is everything, and the timing of this well written and persuasive column is odd. He is telling members why they should vote while recognizing the election is over. Perhaps he senses general surprise and disappointment in the election result and feels members who did not vote, or who chose candidates for the wrong reasons, would be more open to these arguments after the election. Hopefully his arguments will not be forgotten when the next election is held.

A worthwhile message but recognize that broad political perspective is always likely to be polarizing in some way. Try to connect the importance of voting to the shared values and interests that people care about locally in your school district community. It is more likely to be effective for moving people.

Judges' Comments:

A story about a local business that is not owned and operated by a member is an odd duck. At first glance, it seems like it should be a paid promotion. The justification is the 20-year commitment the business has made to the children of the district who cannot afford its services and the fact that those free services are coordinated through the teachers union. The business also gives the teachers a buy-one-get-one-free discount on eyeglasses. The story is not long and a photo of the union president accompanies it with the business owners. This story would be better as a feature news story focused on the services to the children and teacher discounts with quotes at least from teachers or the school nurse. In that format, it could also include a quote from the business owner about their decision and commitment to providing this contribution to the community.

Some good information here that would be stronger with testimonial from members who have used the service and gained something of tangible and intangible value from the relationship.

Judges' Comments:

This is a good message about why unions matter that depends largely on a long list of contractual and legal benefits that members enjoy because the local or other labor groups have negotiated, lobbied, litigated or campaigned for them. The risk of lists is they are judged as much by the omissions as the inclusions and in this case it is interesting to note that safe and healthy workplaces and working conditions are not mentioned, and neither are the worker's due process rights in disciplinary and termination matters. Nevertheless, it is an impressive list and the writer makes it clear these important benefits could disappear quickly without organized labor to defend them.

A lot of information here that could be stronger with some distillation and greater detail to what it specifically means for the working environment for local members. Stress the detail of the rights, benefits and efforts to build solidarity in the local. When members feel connected to their union and support it because they truly own it, threats like Friedrichs become irrelevant.

A good effort to share important information and perspective in the midst of a horrific tragedy. A sharper focus on what this situation means for members locally would strengthen its impact.

It does provide a list of the areas in which the school has been deemed deficient. This call for action seems too much like a single voice crying in the wilderness and it would be more effective if the writer showed how the union members are unified on this point and why. If they are not unified, then perhaps that is where this union leader should begin.

A strong and comprehensive analysis of a complex and relevant issue. It could make stronger impact with some streamlining and distillation and a clearer connection to why this is so important for all faculty.

The writing here is an opinion piece, but it could use some journalistic tools to make it more powerful. No explanatory facts or data are presented in this part of the series. Neither are statements and quotes from members of the union included. It is difficult to assess this story as a

stand-alone piece without seeing what went before it or what may come after it.

Some very important and relevant information here about a significant challenge for the school that affects everyone. Much of the most important points about the necessity of faculty involvement is towards the end. The piece would be stronger by streamlining and distilling some of the contextual debate and emphasizing more of the call to action earlier in the article.

Since this one is dated October and the other two entries are dated July, it is unclear exactly what happened in the interim, especially regarding the possible hiring of a consultant to advise the school in this matter. It is good to see the union's leadership continuing to inform its members about what is going on. However there is actually little information here to help members fully understand what is happening and how it might affect them. Perhaps the embedded links provide more information in that regard. The writing is clear as far as it goes.

A lot of important and relevant information presented here. It would help to streamline and distill it to get at what is most important for the individual member to know and do. Much of the most important call to action is towards the end; some of this should be introduced much earlier in the presentation to make it clear there is a need to be concerned and involved.

A short informational article, which has the potential for a longer more purposeful feature about a project that connected students and the community. Exploring the genesis of the project, some perspective on the work and participation along with comments and testimonials from students and others about the experience would be welcome and valuable for encouraging future opportunities.

The story would be better if it at least included a quote from the union president or one of the members who wrote the grant application.

Informational and straightforward article. It would be enhanced by more explanation about why this will be of value and some quote or testimonial from an individual who will make use of the grant to make this more real for the local.

Local: Patchogue-Medford Congress of Teachers Category: Best Writing Name of Entry: The Mohawks Lead the Way to Bring Robotics Program to Cuba Publication/Website: Speak Out Issue Date: 20161130

Judges' Comments:

This is an interesting news item about high school students who participate in a STEM program and it announces three of these students will travel to Cuba to spend three days with students there to introduce them to the STEM program. The story does not mention teachers or other staff, nor does it include any reference to a union connection. That's really too bad because it would be good to flesh out this brief news item and put it in context. It also could use some quotes from staff and students. Hopefully they will, or have, followed with a report on the trip after the students return. In other words, this is feature story material that's being handled as a news brief.

An informational article about an exciting opportunity. The article could be enhanced with more development about the work of the group that led up to this circumstance and with comments and quotes by them members about what it will truly mean.

Judges' Comments:

This welcome back to school message is accompanied by good news about an agreement reached with the board of education on a small raise for some of the members. But the tone of this announcement has a wistful tinge as the president says she wishes more members had voted on this agreement and had supported their negotiating officers at the board of education meeting. This president's message is well written, but perhaps too subtle. Members may need a more straightforward and direct approach to jar them out of their apathy or possibly resentful detachment.

Some important information here. While leadership can often be frustrating and feel like a no win situation, be careful about taking a tone in communicating to members and the public that may be counterproductive.

Judges' Comments:

This was written early in 2016 before Justice Antonin Scalia's death when this union and others were preparing members for the anticipated shock and challenge of a devastating decision in Friedrichs v. CTA. Borrowing the basic concept of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol," the writer presents the ghost of the labor in the past in comparison to its present and its future. Its imaginative approach is well done and makes a good beginning in what must be a prolonged education process to help members understand how fragile their working conditions are and how easily our entire society can be profoundly changed for the worse.

A clever and well-intentioned approach to a critically important issue. The challenge with an approach like this is to be sure that the reader will be familiar with the context and circumstance. Some simple explanation about the Friedrich's case in an editor's note or early in the article might strengthen the impact here.

This is a very appropriate perspective for him to share with his fellow teachers whose working world revolves around the generation gap. Well done!

A valuable and interesting perspective. More vivid detail about the daughter's point of view, perhaps even a phrase or two, might make it even stronger by connecting more directly into the point of view that is being shared.

Judges' Comments:

It's good to see a union publication adding a column on social responsibility and this labor issue is a good place to start. The point is quickly but effectively made and members are encouraged to think more deeply about the choices they make in their busy day-to-day activities. What this story could use is a bit of spit and polish on spellings and grammar, but the flaws don't diminish the message.

Grammatical error in first sentence is a fatal flaw. Article has a worthwhile message but could use a more direct connection to teachers and the local.

This is a well written story that gives the facts and says why the workers courageous stand matters, not just to the workers who are directly involved, but to future workers and to workers and their families everywhere.

A valuable and relevant connection between the Verizon strike and the struggles of teachers in the local offers a lesson in Labor Solidarity. Drawing the connect more immediately in the column would provide a stronger construct for drawing the reader in - it would make it clear there's something in it for him or her.

Judges' Comments:

This is a very good presentation of the Friedrich's v. CTA case, where it's coming from, its significance and the serious threat it poses to this union and all other public employee unions and ultimately all of organized labor. It leads a special edition of the union's newsletter in February 2016. The story tells just enough and not too much. It is clear and accurate and well organized advocacy journalism.

A commendable effort to provide context and perspective about a serious and relevant challenge facing union members. There is a lot of information here and it's complex, even with an effort to distill it down. Connecting the issue more directly to how it might affect members locally would be a worthwhile effort to pursue and would likely strengthen the impact of the article.

Judges' Comments:

This story effectively describes this member's commitment to the union and how her courage and intelligence made a difference for all of its members and will continue even after she leaves. Her story becomes an inspiration and a model for other union members.

A strong feature article about an outstanding and inspiring activist. The feature would be greatly enhanced with a stronger lede that provides a central focus on this unique and pioneering individual who made such an impact for her co-workers. Some sharpening of the focus would also be helpful throughout the rest of the article, as the anecdotes are interesting and relevant and deserve to make a sharper point.

Judges' Comments:

This is a good, upbeat story that springboards off of reporting on a conference to themes of communication and activism. From a writing perspective, packing so much into one story is a challenge, but this writer does it pretty well. Each of the three parts could be a story in themselves with the conference report as the main bar and the second and third parts as sidebars. Nevertheless, this story gets the job done.

A lot of wide-ranging information presented here. Some sharper focus about the value of the event for addressing practical workplace challenges would be helpful at the beginning. Presenting an overview article about the benefit of the event would be helpful. Breaking the practical information into individual sidebars might be another way to ensure the information is conveyed more effectively.

Judges' Comments:

A well-intentioned and factual argument about the importance of unions. Be careful about writing about the union in a way that makes it a third party entity, rather than embracing them as part of it and helping them to feel that. it is a constant challenge in union communication.

Local: Union of Clerical, Administrative and Technical Staff at NYU Category: Best Writing Name of Entry: Take that lunch break! Publication/Website: Momentum Issue Date: 20160829

Judges' Comments:

This story looks beyond the fast food menu of a new management policy calling for all employees to actually take a lunch break. The writer relates what the contract has to say about this and puts the responsibility back on management to staff adequately so employees are not so overburdened that they feel they can't stop for lunch. The writer also notes that uncompensated work is not just unfair, it's actually a kind of slavery. This is a thoughtful look at what might otherwise seem to be a caring and generous act on the part of management, but it may actually be a reluctance to pay overtime.

There is some valuable information and some important points in this article but it is undermined by snarkiness.

Judges' Comments:

A story about Friedrichs v. CTA; this one is published after the court is evenly divided and the established precedent prevails, but not before the general election last November. This story, written for members of a private-sector union, looks at all of the history and significance of the case and concludes that the firing squad is simply reloading. This story is well written and informative. It is a call to action, but perhaps lacks the urgency that it might express if it were written after the election. In any event, it creates a sound foundation for the longer-term educational effort that this and all unions must make on this issue.

A comprehensive overview of a complex and challenging case. The article gets into a lot of "inside baseball" and would likely benefit from some streamlining and distillation down to what is most important for the individual in the local to know. In this respect, more emphasis on why this is important and how it might affect an individual member would also enhance the impact.

Judges' Comments:

This report on a recent labor-management meeting highlights the significant topics and how they were handled at the meeting. It's a good, useful report.

Straightforward and informational article about labor-management issues. The information is well organized and broken into digestible chunks. However, some additional context for each issue might be helpful. This always raises a tension between making it more understandable and keeping it to the point.

Streamlining and distilling the information even more would likely help enhance this article.

Judges' Comments:

Another strong column- connecting a big picture issue to the local while providing interesting and valuable insight. Some further development of why it's important would make it even stronger.

This is an articulate, thoughtful, and insightful look at what seems like tectonic social shifts, but may actually be backlash and powerful resistance to change more than change, itself.

An interesting and well-written personal perspective of some important big picture issues. Some streamlining and distillation along with more effort to connect the article to the interests of people in the local would also strengthen it.

So, this first-person account is not ideal, but the course and campaign are cool and so is this story about them. It's stacked with impressive facts and data to back up the sales pitch. But it begs for other voices to help tell the tale.

A valuable and sincere perspective that offers strong insight into a local initiative around a bigger national challenge. The first person approach makes the information real and

relevant. The connection to the local community along with valuable context is very helpful to create understanding. The piece might even be stronger with some commentary, quotes, etc., from participating students.

A strong perspective that provides important information and raises some necessary points for further consideration. The article would be stronger by tying the issue more directly to the interest of people in the local early on. Some streamlining would also help sharpen the focus.

A lot of interesting and valuable information presented here. It would be stronger with some streamlining and distillation into a clearer, more focused narrative that connects the Verizon experience to the challenges members of the local face!

More detail connecting what happened in Wisconsin with the daily challenges that members of the local face would strengthen the impact of this work.

Judges' Comments:

This is one union member's approach to the 2016 general election. It is difficult not to wade into the waters of the today's national political scene. It is also likely to be a no-win situation for a local union. Politics are polarizing. It is better to approach relationship building within the local around issues where common ground can be found.

While the sentiments here are very understandable, this might have been a stronger argument if it truly focused on voting for the children and articulated a constructive, hopeful set of arguments for what (not who) should matter in our electoral season. Politics will always be polarizing in the local and seeking common ground is a higher road to take.
